Children's Room Program Schedule

Small Adventures (ages 3-6) and page: Story Explorers (ages 7-12) and their families meet for stories, activities, crafts and more! These groups meet the second and fourth Wednesdays of the month at 10

Family Fun Night for ages 3-3rd grade is an evening story time where we share themed stories, songs, crafts and activities. Family Fun Night meets the third Thursday of the month at 6:30 p.m..

Story Spinners for grades 3-5 is held third Tuesday of the month at the Ferry Street Annex from 3:30 p.m. — 4:45 p.m. We read and discuss a book, do themed crafts and have a snack. Diverse reading abilities are welcomed.

Story times for 3-5 year olds: choose from one of two weekday story times on either Mondays or the Children's Room this sum- Thursdays at 10 a.m We read stories, sing songs and make a craft. Each session runs 8-10 weeks. If someone misses two weeks in a row without calling to keep their place, we must call the next person on the waiting list. Those waiting have first opportunity to register for the new session. All participants must reregister for each new session.

> Lullaby Lapsit for infant-2 year olds will meet every Friday at 11 a.m. Complete with tickle songs, nursery rhymes and poems, this program lasts about 45 minutes with the last 15 minutes set aside for parents to read to their child.

25th anniversary of Banned **Books Week**

"More than a book a day faces expulsion from free and open public access in U.S. schools and libraries every year. Throughout history, there always have been a few people who don't want information to be freely available. And this is still true," said ALA President Leslie Burger.

Bookstores and libraries around the country will celebrate the freedom to read during Banned Books Week, September 23-30. First observed in 1982, Banned Books Week reminds Americans not to take this precious democratic freedom for granted.

Robie Harris's It's Perfectly Normal was the most challenged book of last year. Rounding out the top four most challenged books in 2005 were:

Forever by Judy Blume for sexual content and offensive language;

The Catcher in the Rye by J.D. Salinger for sexual content, offensive language and being unsuited to age group;

The Chocolate War by Robert Cormier for sexual content and offensive language; and

Banned Books Week is sponsored the American by Booksellers Association, American Booksellers Foundation for Free Expression, the ALA, the Association of American Publishers, the American Society of Journalists and Authors, and the National Association of College Stores. It is endorsed by the Library of Congress Center for the Book.
