Sunday, December 14,12-3 p.m.



Hang A Shining Star Upon The Highest Bough It is believed that the tradition of

the Christmas tree, like many other

Christmas traditions, originated in Germany. Having a Christmas tree to symbolize life during the holidays was practiced well before the beginning of Christianity. Romans and Egyptians used trees and boughs during the winter solstice celebrations to decorate their homes. During the middle ages, a paradise tree was hung with apples at the feast of Adam and Eve on December 24. In Latvia, the first decorated tree appeared around 1510. It is held that Martin Luther, on his way home saw stars shining Dangers to the Global Economybrightly through the fir trees, which lit the dark night. This inspired him to recreate this effect by placing candles on the branches of his tree. Christmas trees have been decorated with many items over the years. Food items were the symbol of plenty and paper flowers were symbolic of the tree in the Garden of Eden. Another constant of Christmas tree decorating is tinsel. It also originated in Germany about 1610. Interestingly, the original tinsel was actually made with pulled silver until the mid-19th century. Besides tinsel, the first trees were decorated with small beads, candles, and silver wire ornaments, many of which were made in the home. In the latter part of the 1800s, new innovations such as the electric lights and metal hooks for ornaments emerged. We are all familiar with the new trees and decorations that have appeared in the last twenty years or so. Artificial trees (including fiber optic lights) and safety lights already on lit trees are just a couple. I have an artificial tree because my husband is allergic to the fresh ones, but I miss the fun of picking out, tagging and bringing home a fresh cut tree. Maybe I'll buy one of the pine sprays and make it smell real!
