

# **Reference Resources** Morningstar & Value Line

The library has a subscription to Morningstar Mutual Funds to assist patrons with their financial planning. Morningstar is the premier source of unbiased information and one of the most-trusted and frequently cited sources of independent mutual funds. You will find current and historical quotes for over 90,000 investments and indepth analysis of nearly 40,000 mutual funds and stocks.

The library also has a subscription to Value Line Investment Survey, an invaluable resource for investors. A weekly reporting service, it provides reports, ratings and analysis for major industries and approximately 1,700 stocks. Included are earnings and dividends, and stock price projections. The Value Line Small and Mid-Cap edition reports provide detailed descriptions and balance sheets of 1.800 stocks not included in the regular edition. Both subscriptions are located in the reference area of the main room.


