Library Warrant Articles

The ballot for the Hudson Town election on March 11, 2008, will have a number of warrant articles to be decided by the voters. Two of the warrant articles are concerned with the town library. Warrant article 9 approves a very thrifty salary increase for full time Library staff.

Warrant article 13 deals with two properties at 47 and 49 Ferry St. purchased in 1999 and 2003 with support of the town voters in the hope of expanding the Hills Memorial Library on adjacent property. That plan was eventually deemed infeasible due to costs and environmental factors. These properties have been used for overflow library functions in the ensuing years.

The library trustees are submitting Warrant Article 13 to allow the sale of these properties and the return of the funds to the Library Building Fund for use in fitting-up and furnishing the new Rodgers' Memorial Library, made possible by the generous gift of Phil and Al Rodgers. Passage of this warrant article would also return the two properties to the Town tax rolls.

Both of the warrant articles have been approved by the board of selectmen and the budget committee.

Please vote on March 11, and thank you for considering these two warrant articles.

Rodgers Library Project Updates

On October 24, 2007 the Trustees for the Hudson Library gratefully accepted the generous donation-\$4M— from Phil and Al Rodgers for the construction of a new Library named in memory of their parents, George and Ella Rodgers.

In the ensuing four months the

trustees have been working diligently on the new library project: including confirming permission from the board of selectmen for the use of the land; meeting with the architects to confirm the plans; clearing contractual issues with the Town attorneys; seeking/hiring a highly qualified construction management firm-North Branch Construction— to build the structure; applying for necessary approvals and permits, and other tasks related to a seamless professional process.

As part of the process it is necessary to access funds previously allocated for a new town library which have not been liquidated because of the inability to move forward without the Rodgers' brothers gift. Thus there will be a warrant article on the town ballot in March which is part of that process – warrant article 13—to allow the sale of these properties and the tool that offers timely, accurate return of the funds to the library information taken from reliable building fund.

The Alvirne High School Forestry Department will be clearing trees from the route 102 land in preparation for ground-breaking early this spring.

The library IT staff is currently working on a web site to update the progress of the new Rodgers library building project. The site will be accessible via the Hills Memorial website www.hillsml. lib.nh.us sometime this month.
