Library Use Is Up

Several newspaper articles have been written this summer and radio shows have broadcasted the good news about increased library use of area libraries. While statistics from the HML have not been cited per se in these articles, I will share some of our statistics and correct an oversight on the part of the journal-

HML saw a 5% increase (151,650 items) in materials circulated in FY08. Though not as big a jump as the FY07 (143,800 items)



crease of 15%, it shows we are keeping up with the trend and actually might have been at the leading edge of the trend last year.

We circulated 49.5 items per hour. The number of Internet users and the number of Interlibrary Loans stayed just about the same as last year, but attendance at programs was up 10%. We are averaging just under 1,000 new patrons per year. Due to decentralization of services spread out over several "buildings", we do not keep a "door count" of the number of people entering the library (Please note that 24/7 library services are available via our virtual catalog, subscription databases and downloadable books.) Anecdotally, if you ask a staff working at the circ desks "how's business?" they will tell you that they are busier than normal.

It is gratifying to see taxpayers and townspeople take advantage of all the free services their library provides and we are anticipating that our new library will be a BIG impetus for people to come see us and then remain to avail themselves of the wonderful services we offer.

To quote Anne Herbert: Libraries will get you through times with no money better than money will get you through times with no libraries.

On September 16 at 1:30 p.m. and September 23 at 7 p.m., we will be discussing Lois Lowry's award winning young adult novel The Giver. This story of a dystopian future where anything unpleasant, including emotions, is suppressed, was recently challenged in Nashua. A parent requested that it not be taught in the elementary schools and be removed from the elementary school libraries due to mature themes such as euthanasia. The school board agreed to require parental permission if the book is read in class at the elementary level but declined to remove it from libraries. National Banned Books Week starts September 29 so it is fitting that we read a book that has been challenged in schools during this month. The afternoon book discussion group meets on the third Tuesday of the month at 1:30 p.m., the evening book discussion group meets on the fourth Tuesday at 7 p.m. The Books are available in Annex II.
