Our library has a subscription to Morningstar available in the main room. Morningstar Mutual Funds can help assist you with your financial planning. It is the mosttrusted and frequently cited source for independent mutual fund information and is considered the most authoritative resource for comparing. evaluating. and choosing mutual funds.

The library also subscribes to ValueLine Investment Survey, including the Small and Mid-Cap Survey. ValueLine is а comprehensive source of information and analysis of approximately 1700 stocks in 98 industries, the stock market and the economy. ValueLine contains a summary and index of all stocks in the investment survey. Included in the summary are 3 - 5 year growth projections as well as current information to help keep investors informed about the latest company results. It is also backed by and independent research staff of approximately 80 experienced professional security analysts and statisticians. Three Cups Of Tea **Book Discussions**


