A Moving Update

We are getting ready to move to our beautiful new library facility donated to our Town by Phil and Alvin Rodgers. Moving a library is a very complex endeavor. Add to that a name and address change, decisions related to the use of the HML building. We have been anticipating this move for almost a year and during that time we have undertaken several projects to ready ourselves for new/expanded library location and services for our patrons.

We realize that you, our valued patrons, will be experiencing many changes in the next few months. Not the least among them is the inconvenience of being without full library service for a few weeks during the move. We are working on making the change as painless as possible and are investigating a couple of options. We offer a few suggestions for your library needs during the month of April.

The Board of Trustees has voted to close the Library for the month beginning in early April to pack, move and prepare to reopen for business in early May. Please try to anticipate your library needs for the month and plan accordingly.

- Tax Forms will be available in the back foyer of the HML until April 10 possibly even later. (The deadline for filing is April 15). After April 10, you should to plan to download the IRS forms from the Internet. We will have a small supply of IRS Tax Forms available after we reopen in early May.
- Starting March 16, the due date for materials circulated for a 3 week period will be May 11.

- DVDs will remain 1 week circulated items until March 30. After that DVDs checked out will be due May 11.
- Museum passes reserved for dates April 5 May 11, must be picked up by 5 PM closing on April 4. (April school vacation falls within this time period.)
- Requests for ILL materials will not be taken from March 22—May 11. Any Ill materials received at HML will have to be picked up by closing on Saturday April 4, otherwise they will be returned to the lending library.
- All borrowed items may still be returned to the outside book drops at HML through April
 12
 - Prior to April 5, we encourage you to check out as many items (except for DVDs which remain at a limit of 10/card) as you can keep track of during the month. We will extend the date due to May 11. (If there unanticipated opening delays we will of course extend grace the period to accommodate that circumstance.) You will however be responsible, as always, for any materials you check out during the extended loan period.
- Please zero any fines by April
 4. Only those patrons with clear patron accounts will be eligible for "guest" borrowing privileges should we be able to arrange for some kind of temporary agreement with neighboring libraries.

Once we have moved to the new Library:

We will be issuing new library

cards once we move to the new Library. You can retain and use your HML 14 digit library card, swap your HML card for a Rodgers Memorial Library (RML) card at no cost. New patrons will be issued an RML card as standard operating procedure.

- You will need to show your library card when taking out materials, or using the computers/Internet. The new library cards will have a "keychain tag" so showing your library card should not present any problem such as leaving your card at home, etc.
- Non-Residents or AHS/ PMA students can show their drivers license or present a school ID in order to use the computers as is the current practice at the Hills Memorial Library.
- Certain privileges for Hudson Library patrons may be available at neighboring libraries. Watch for further information.
- Programming will resume in May.
- Further changes and updates will be announced as the moving plans progress.

This is a very exciting time for everyone as we anticipate a wonderful new facility. We appreciate your patience, forbearance, understanding and we are very sorry for any inconvenience. Thank you for cooperating with these temporary procedures and please stay updated via the HML Website.
